JOBS FOR FEBRUARY

Remove old plants, weed, add compost, plant warm-season vegetables, harvest ripe crops, water heavily due to summer heat, prune, divide perennials, collect seeds, and mulch to retain moisture.

As February is typically the last month of summer in Australia, prioritize managing heat stress on plants and preparing for the cooler months ahead.

PARKING SPACES IN THE GARDEN

There is a recycled plastic product that comes in squares that once clicked together forms a grid, and there is an option from hardwares called *SurePave*. There is also a more robust version from a company called *Elmich*. This grid can be placed in the ground with the gaps filled with the soil that has been dug out to install the grid and then turf grass laid on top.

It won't protect the leaves, but the roots are protected by the grid, so recovery times are very quick.

For an area that isn't used for parking every day, it's great and will keep the surrounding plant life happy, too.

A suggested hard grass would be *TifTuf Hybrid Bermuda* on top, as it is drought tolerant and hardy to wear.

A GREAT RECIPE



PRAWN, CORIANDER & COCONUT RICE

1 1/2 cups (330g) jasmine rice Zest of 1 lime 1/4 cup (60ml) lime juice 1 tbsp grated palm sugar or brown sugar

1/2 cup (125ml) coconut cream 1 bunch coriander, leaves picked 1 long red chilli, seeds removed, finely chopped 2 tbsp peanut oil 1kg cooked prawns, peeled (tails intact)

1 telegraph cucumber, finely chopped

4 spring onions, thinly sliced 1/4 cup (35g) chopped roasted peanuts

Step 1

Cook rice according to packet instructions. Rinse under cold water, drain, then cool.

Step 2

Place lime zest and juice, sugar, coconut cream and coriander, reserving 2 tablespoons to garnish, in a blender. Whiz to a smooth puree, stir in chilli, then season to taste.

Step 3

Toss the cooled rice with the prawns, oil, cucumber, spring onion and coriander dressing. Divide among plates, scatter with peanuts and extra coriander leaves, then serve with lime wedges.


